Assistant Principal's Report



Our religious calendar has been rich with meaningful celebrations. We began with an Opening School Mass at St Carthage's Cathedral, bringing our school community together in prayer and in celebration of the new school year. Student Welfare: A Year of Growth, Support, and Community



As the Leader of Student Welfare at St John's College Woodlawn, 2024 has been one of reflection, growth, and unwavering dedication to the well-being of our students. The role of Pastoral Care extends beyond just addressing students' academic needs - it encompasses their emotional, social, and mental health, ensuring that every student

feels supported, valued, and understood. Whether it was helping students navigate the complexities of high school life or providing a safe space for them to express their emotions and concerns, pastoral care was at the heart of our College's mission to nurture the whole child.

A Year of Connection and Compassion

Every school year presents unique challenges, whether it is new Year 7 students starting high school and finding their way around a new environment, or Year 12 students who have reached their final year of schooling and are looking forward to what their future may hold, or those in between. Here at Woodlawn, we prioritised creating an environment where students had the opportunity to build trust and connect with each other and with staff who are committed to their well-being. Our dedicated team of Year Coordinators, Counsellors, and support staff worked tirelessly to ensure that every student had access to the resources they needed. Whether students were struggling with anxiety, navigating the pressures of academic life, or facing personal challenges, we have provided guidance and support that helped them regain their confidence and sense of belonging.

Highlights of the Year:

Well-being Weeks: We organised a series of student-led initiatives for 'Bullying No Way' and 'R U OK?' weeks that focused on mental health, stress management, and building resilience. These sessions and activities helped students gain practical skills to cope with life's challenges while fostering a culture of openness about mental health and other key issues that young people are exposed to today. Sincere thanks to our Year 10 Social Justice Team and the Year 11 Vinnies groups who created wonderful resources for the entire College to engage in these important conversations.

Pastoral Care Program Years 7 - 9

This year, we expanded our Pastoral Care Program to extend this rich opportunity to Year 9 students. Each fortnight the respective Year Coordinator engaged with their year group Base Classes to build our sense of community. Our focus areas for each year group have been:

Year 7 Launchpad Overview

Launchpad supports students as they transition from Primary to Secondary education. Our program ensures a smooth transition, focusing on skills for learning, personal well-being, and what it means to be a part of 'The Woodlawn Way.'

In Year 7, we emphasised belonging - within ourselves, with each other, and with the wider community.

Launchpad is the first encounter our students have with the core values of our College: Faith, Integrity, Relationships, and Empathy (F.I.R.E.).

Year 8 Flightpath Overview

The Year 8 Flightpath program builds on the foundation laid in Year 7, focusing on communication, self-awareness, and making healthy choices.

It begins by setting the tone for effective communication and leadership within the College community. Students explore learning styles and study techniques to develop a passion for lifelong learning. The program addresses bullying, discusses appropriate responses, and distinguishes between 'upstander' and 'bystander' behaviour, aiming to build self-esteem and promote positive social interactions.

Year 9 Navigate Overview

The Year 9 Navigate program incorporates foundational pastoral care concepts and starts preparing students to navigate the challenges of senior schooling and adolescence. A stronger emphasis on personal responsibilities, resilience and stress management, help students understand expectations, set goals, and develop coping mechanisms through mindfulness and relaxation techniques.

Student Camps and Senior Retreats

Our annual camps and Senior Retreat allowed students to disconnect from the pressures of daily school life and reconnect with themselves and their peers in a meaningful way. These opportunities fostered team building, encouraged self-reflection, and provided students with the tools to manage stress and develop a deeper sense of empathy and community. Our sincere thanks to all staff who attended these rich opportunities that took them away from their own families for two nights at a time.

Without your support, these opportunities would not be available to our students.

Looking Forward:

As we close out the year, I am incredibly proud of the progress we have made as a College community. However, the work of Pastoral Care is never done, and while I have decided to return to the classroom, I am confident that our team will continue to build a supportive environment where every student feels empowered to thrive, both academically and personally. With the help of our dedicated staff, parents, and students, I am confident that we will continue to nurture well-rounded individuals who are prepared to face the challenges of tomorrow with strength, compassion, and resilience.

To our parents, sincere thanks for your continued support and trust that we have your child's best interest at heart in all our discernments.

To all our students: thank you for your openness, courage, and commitment to making our school a better place. You are the heart of everything we do, and it is a privilege to walk alongside you on your journey.

Father Lionel Marsden Award

Jake Roff Memorial Award

Jake Roff was a true Marist who left an indelible mark on the Woodlawn community. Jake was a dedicated and humble teacher, he was focused, entertaining and compassionate. Jake's ability to lift others embodied the Marist spirit. Jake's impact was deeply felt when he passed away in 2015 after a battle with brain cancer.

In honour of Jake's legacy, his family established this award to recognise a student who reflects his values, humility, compassion, service, inclusivity, and a deep trust in human nature. This is a very special award, and those who receive it uphold the spirit of Jake.

The 2024 recipient of the Jake Roff Memorial Award is Tia Mitchell.

Premier's ANZAC Memorial Scholarship



This year, I had the honour of being selected as part of the Premier's ANZAC Memorial Scholarship contingent. I engaged in a study tour of Japan, researching Australian and Japanese service during the Second World War. The initial phase of the selection process involved writing a 1000-word essay about

my understanding, respect for and interest in Australian service and peacekeeping. This included specific reference to the words of Charles Bruce Dellit, architect of the ANZAC memorial in Hyde Park, "Courage, endurance and sacrifice". I drew on my passion for Modern History, my experience in the Cambodia immersion, and my personal values and experiences throughout to properly represent my views and knowledge.

Upon hearing the news of my acceptance, I, of course, was overjoyed. I was able to meet the other 19 students in NSW who received the scholarship and quickly realised we would become close friends. I find it hard to think about a highlight of the tour, as I was able to experience so many life-altering things each day. From the stories of Australians, including Fr Lionel Marsden, a Woodlawn alumnus whom I was tasked with researching and presenting his story, as well as Kay Parker, a relative of mine, who was researched by another scholar. We were able to visit many significant sites and places of learning, some being the Hiroshima Peace Park, Naoetsu Peace Memorial and the Yokohama War cemetery.


The experiences that we shared, both historical and cultural, were enriched by the guidance of Dr Keiko Tamura, Anthropologist and researcher at ANU, as well as the accompanying teachers and many local researchers and Historians that we had the opportunity to meet throughout the tour. The main focus of our tour was to research the way that Japan commemorates the Second World War and how it is different to Australia, as well as the relationship between Australia and Japan throughout the war and afterwards.





The Premier's ANZAC Memorial Scholarship is an experience that has given me a new perspective on History and World affairs which is something that will stay with me for the rest of my life. In retrospect, this experience has had a much larger impact on me than I had originally anticipated. I now have a much more personal and in-depth understanding of the things that I thought I already knew in a way that extends beyond any expectation of myself.










































2024 has been a year of growth for our Year 9 students. We have bonded as a cohort and tackled challenges head-on, showing resilience and compassion for one another.



Learning and Teaching: A Year of Growth and Achievement

Religious Education: Christ-Centred Learning



2024 has been a dynamic and inspiring year for Religious Education at Woodlawn. The Religious Education team has been dedicated to enabling students through approach that engages the head, heart, and hands of every learner. Students have been encouraged to dive deeply into the curriculum, discovering ways to

connect their studies to real-life experiences. In Years 7 to 10, the Catholic Studies programs have included the core PBL principles, guiding students from surface understanding to deep exploration, and finally to transfer learning by applying their insights in meaningful, practical and contemporary contexts. Additionally, there has been a renewed focus on improving student skills in writing cohesive paragraphs that integrate Scripture.

This year, we welcomed a new cohort of Year 7 students who embarked on a journey to explore "What it means to be Catholic." Through Cathedral visits, Masses and ongoing reflections, they delved into the significance of the Liturgical Calendar and participated in meaningful Church liturgies on Holy Days. A highlight for Year 7 was their participation in the Stations of the Cross in Holy Week, where they used artwork and thoughtful reflections to connect with this profound tradition. Their understanding of the Bible as the Christian sacred text that reveals God's love for humanity deepened too. Among the many impressive projects, students prepared Care Packages for the "We Are Many, We Are One" unit and put their artistic skills to work in a Christmas Card competition. Year 7 also engaged with the concept of Stewardship, learning about Pope Francis's teachings on caring for our world. These experiences have enriched their journey and set a meaningful foundation for their faith and learning.

In Year 8, Catholic Studies classes continued to explore the RENEW units, which focused on the Sacraments of Initiation and how they empower Christians to live fully within the life of the Church. Through the lens of Jesus' teachings and example, students explored the key events and figures that shaped early Christianity, reflecting on how these foundational influences still resonate today. They also investigated individuals who embody virtue, considering how they, too, can lead authentic lives of faith and contribute to a more harmonious world. By developing strong inquiry skills and examining the impact of influential people and organisations, our Year 8 students have learned to live out values that uplift and unify their communities.

Year 9 Catholic Studies students have been a journey of discovery, challenging students to engage the head, heart, and hands in meaningful ways. This year, students explored the Bible's literary forms, reflected on the Beatitudes, and examined their relevance to contemporary social and ethical issues impacting adolescents. Through inquiry-based learning, they delved into the Sacraments of Healing and created multimodal presentations on these sacraments, highlighting their work through engaging platforms like Google Sites and video tutorials. This student-centered approach honed their research and IT skills while encouraging independence. One of the year's highlights was an in-depth essay on the Catholic Church's contributions to Australian society, particularly in education, social welfare, healthcare, and support for refugees. This task allowed students to develop and refine their writing abilities while thinking critically and creatively about the Church's role in Australia. Students finished the year with lively discussions related to the unit: Search for Meaning.

Year 10 Catholic Studies provided students with a rich journey through sacred Scripture, focusing on the person of Jesus and developing skills in exegesis, an invaluable foundation for their Senior studies. By analysing the Gospels, students connected scriptural meaning to their own lives, encouraging personal reflection on their roles in the world. Through a Church history unit, they explored how historical events have shaped the Church, moving into discussions on ecumenism and interfaith dialogue. This learning prompted students to consider how they might live out their faith while honouring the dignity of others. A memorable Chapel incursion with Fr. Peter

Slack allowed students to learn about the Sacrament of Service and the life of a Parish Priest, deepening their understanding of vocation and service. The year concluded with a focus on Catholic Social Teaching, fitting for students involved in the Social Justice Committee and the Cambodia Immersion, where they experienced the call to make a difference in the world.

In Stage 6, students in Studies of Religion have engaged in a rich curriculum covering Aboriginal Spirituality, Christianity, and major world religions such as Islam and Judaism. This broad exposure has deepened their understanding of the diverse nature of religious belief and practice, fostering empathy and respect for different faiths. 

travelled to the Queensland Medical Research Institute and to the University of Queensland Pathology Labs. Students were involved in observing and collecting data related to the syllabus. It was a great hands-on experience that was enjoyed by all. All students displayed a level of engagement which is to be commended. They actively applied the skills they had learned over the three terms to analyse genetic data and observe interesting disease symptoms. Year 11 Biology travelled to Hastings Point for some real-life sampling of the rocky shore ecosystem in a field study.

The Junior school continued the use of the interactive teaching program, STILE, as well as classroom activities. We have found it engaging for all students. It offers both fun learning activities and accountability by students. The science staff have been using enquiry learning to help students achieve learning outcomes with some fun, creative and interesting results. The Year 7 students made some amazing cell models for their assessment

Human Society and its Environment (HSIE)

2024 was another busy and exciting year in the Humanities Faculty with new courses running, strong student numbers across our many senior subjects, and a variety of excursions, field trips and competitions.

The key learning area of Humanities encompasses a broad range of subjects that have real-world applications, including History, Geography, Commerce, Business Studies, Legal Studies, Society and Culture, and Work Studies. These subjects allow students to understand and critically reflect on social issues.

Some highlights of the 2024 Year include:





Year 12 Geography - Moreton Island

In Week 9 of Term 1, Year 12 Geography students - the largest class in the past decade - embarked on their week-long field trip to Moreton Island, ably led by their class teacher Mr Bailey with the assistance of Mrs Pearson and Mr Hayden. This immersive learning experience focused on the 'Ecosystems At Risk' unit and formed part of their HSC Assessment. Students conducted field observations at the Tangalooma Wrecks, where they snorkelled amongst an impressive array of marine life, including green turtles, wobbegongs, and lionfish, along with over 200 other fish species that make this reef ecosystem so diverse. The class also explored the fragile coastal dune ecosystem and visited the Moreton Bay Rock Oyster Farm, sampling local produce while studying their People and Economic Activity unit. This valuable field experience has become a highlight of the HSIE academic year.

Year 11 Geography - Minyon Falls

During their studies of the Human Environment Interactions unit, the Year 11 Geography class participated in a mandatory fieldwork excursion to Minyon Falls. This trip allowed students to assess the management and protection of Australia's forests while also examining the impacts of tourism on local ecosystems. Studying Australia's Eastern forests is integral to understanding key syllabus content and has allowed students to connect with their surroundings, putting their learning into action.





The day consisted of hiking, rock-hopping, and several stops along Repentance Creek to admire the amazing scenery. During this time students made several observations of the natural processes occurring in the rich ecosystems within Minyon Falls. They then assessed how humans impact these processes, evaluated current management strategies and proposed new plans for future development.



Year 9 Geography - Shaws Bay

In Term 3, Year 9 Geography students completed mandatory fieldwork at Shaws Bay in Ballina. Whilst it is a fun day out in the sun, this trip is also an integral part of Stage 5



Geography which allows students to make observations on coastal landforms and their management, a key focus for the Term 3 unit of study 'Environmental Change and Management'. The completion of this fieldwork is also a mandatory element of the Stage 5 Geography course.

The day consisted of three 'stations', which saw students and their teachers rotate around Shaws Bay, observing the coastal landforms at the site including the headland at Ballina Head Lookout, sand dunes, Lighthouse Beach, spits, and sandbars. Students were then asked to consider the stakeholders of these landforms and how they are impacted by ongoing natural processes such as erosion, deposition and longshore drift.

The day was enjoyed by all and proved to be a valuable learning experience which enabled our students to apply their knowledge of coastal landforms and management to the real world. We hope to continue this experience for all future students at the College.

Year 7 Geography Incursion

In Term 1 Year 7 Geography students enjoyed a school incursion to explore the College grounds and make observations about the environment that surrounds them daily. This incursion is part of the "Landscapes and Landforms" unit of study. This gave the students the opportunity to see new parts of the school including the rainforest.

The afternoon consisted of students navigating between three separate locations and engaging in discussions about their observations of the various natural and human landscapes. The locations consisted of our rainforest, the river by the Colin Centre and the far side of the oval. Students built on their geographical skills, including the creation of field sketches.

This was a great opportunity for students to experience an immersive approach to their learning and interact with areas of the College they don't normally see every day.

BUSINESS STUDIES



Year 12 Business Studies - Excursion to **Zentvelds Coffee and Roastery**

As part of the HSC Business Studies program, we are grateful for the partnership and the opportunity to visit local businesses to gain insights into their success. The Year 12 students visited Zentvelds Coffee Farm & Roastery in Newrybar, which provided them with a case study and a variety of examples of the operations and marketing of a local business that operates globally.



Year 11 Business Studies - Excursion to **Stone & Wood Brewery**

Year 11 Business Studies students visited Stone & Wood Brewery in Byron Bay. They were taken on a tour of the facilities and learnt about the history of the business as well as the way they exercise their corporate social responsibility.

The main focus of the visit was learning about the interesting human resource strategies and management approaches that Stone & Wood has implemented. The students were impressed with all of the perks the staff get including free beer and gym memberships!

Legal studies

Year 11 Legal Studies - Lismore Court House

The Year 11 Legal Studies class had 5 students this year which made it logistically easy for us to visit the Lismore Court House and observe cases being heard in both the Magistrates and the Local Courts.

Students were able to observe some interesting cases that included drug offences and weapons charges. The Magistrate in the Magistrates Court was very kind and explained the case to the students and let them ask questions.

Visiting the Court House was a great way to see the law in action and consolidated students' knowledge of the court system.

Legal Studies - Mock Trial

This year Southern Cross University invited Legal Studies classes from local high schools to compete in an inaugural Mock Trial competition. Kate Alexander, Shelby Bon, Ella Cohen, Eliza Herman and Tobhiyah Louis formed Woodlawn's Mock Trial team, taking the role of the Prosecution in a fictional case involving young adults acting suspiciously at a local music festival and resulting in a drug charge. These students were supervised by their Legal Studies teachers Mrs Cani and Mrs Challinor, and aided with additional legal expertise from Mrs McPhee.

Facing Alstonville High, our students performed admirably, showing knowledge of the rules to utilise 'objections' effectively which rattled the Defence team. Our score sheet showed that we were awarded very high marks by Judge Radburn. Another Judge spoke glowingly to our students about his own time as a student at Woodlawn, when the school was still a boarding school. While not the overall winners of the competition, our students demonstrated a promising future in law or law enforcement.

History

Year 10 - Sydney Jewish Museum **Excursion**



In Term 2 twenty very excited Year 10 students boarded the train in Casino for the twelve-hour journey to Sydney to attend the Jewish Museum. This excursion has been a longstanding tradition of the College that was put on pause due to Covid restrictions and we are thrilled that the opportunity is available to students and staff again.

For three days the students attended the museum, examining the wide range of artefacts and displays as well as attending workshops on topics including



Genocide, Jewish Resistance and the Holocaust, and Jewish history and culture. Not only did this extend their knowledge of their History focus study on the Holocaust but also introduced them to content they will be studying in Studies of Religion. The highlight of the trip, however, was hearing the stories of three Holocaust survivors; Ella, Paul and Susan and having the opportunity to ask questions about their experiences in Europe before the war, in hiding, in the ghettos, and in the camps, as well as about their lives since coming to Australia.

The students also spent time exploring the city and visiting the Anzac Memorial where they found Lismore listed in the Hall of Service which displays soil from towns, cities, suburbs and homesteads given as a home address for those who enlisted in WWI. A trip on the famous Manly Ferry was also a highlight.

Year 9 History (Elective)

This course ran for the first time at the College this year and so a group of like-minded, motivated students got to explore History beyond the mandatory curriculum. In Term 1 they explored History in Film, analysing a historical film of their choice. In Term 2 they gained an understanding of the Roman Republic and Empire, highlighting the idea that all roads lead to Rome. During this time they also completed individual and group research projects for the National History Challenge, linking to the theme of the year: Crisis and Response. Term 3 saw the class exploring the themes of Heroes and Villains through the Tudor period and they created a museum display around an individual of their choice. The students' favourite topic was left for last, with the class exploring the Titanic. An excursion to visit the Titanic Exhibition in Brisbane, allowed students to see the artefacts and media from the time. We are hopeful that this course will run again soon.

Year 8 - Night of the Notables

Night of the Notables is a highlight of the Term 4 Calendar, where all Year 8 students present an historical investigation of a person of historical significance. It is also an engaging and fun excuse to dress up as an historical figure and role-play some important personalities from our past. Parents were invited to support this annual event, arriving at the College in the early evening to wander the halls of history and learn about their favourite figures.

Humanities in Stage 6 2023

The Humanities students continue to excel in a range of subjects. Of particular note was the Ancient History cohort where 25% of students received a Band 6 and overall results were 7.29% above State average. Tia Jegen received a Band 6 in Society & Culture. Students also received Band 5s across all Humanities subjects offered this year: Business Studies, Italian, Modern History, Geography and Legal Studies. Modern History and Society & Culture marks were also above the State average. Congratulations to all those students and special thanks to their teachers, whose dedication and professionalism continue to inspire, motivate and nurture our Senior students.

In 2024, Year 11 Humanities teachers welcomed a large cohort of students into Stage 6 courses, and they have embraced the content and rigour with great enthusiasm.

Our Stage 5 Photography and Digital Media students have had a dynamic year, exploring a range of photographic skills and techniques. Here's a look at their journey:

In Term 1, students explored "The Camera Never Lies, but Photoshop Does" by manipulating images in Photoshop, creating themes like multiplicity, ghost imagery, and even placing themselves in famous paintings.

Term 2 focused on "Classic Themes", where students studied photography history, explored camera types, and analysed works by iconic photographers like

Man Ray and Ansel Adams. This term deepened their technical knowledge and appreciation for photographic conventions.

The unit, "Low Tech. High Tech" in Term 3, introduced polaroid and cyanotype techniques, encouraging students to create a cohesive folio on identity. This allowed them to experiment with unique perspectives and storytelling.

In Term 4, "Animate It" shifted focus to stop-motion and claymation. Students created storyboards and explored animation techniques while studying contemporary photographers Michael Cook and Darren Siwes.

Throughout the year, they completed a variety of projects, from colour burst photography and portraiture to macro and architectural forms. Our Photography and Digital Media students have demonstrated outstanding creativity and technical growth in their work, making this an inspiring year for the entire Faculty.

In Sydney, our Year 11 Visual Art students experienced the ArtExpress exhibition and the Biennale of Sydney. Meanwhile, the Biennale of Sydney opened up discussions about global contemporary art and current social themes, from environmental concerns to explorations of identity and connection. Technical & Applied Studies (TAS)

The Technology and Applied Studies (TAS) Faculty offers a range of interesting and exciting learning opportunities for our students.

Students in TAS research, design and construct a variety of projects from an exciting array of focus areas from both mandatory and elective courses from Years 7 – 12. The main subjects fall under the umbrellas of Technology (AgriFood, Digital, Engineering & Materials), Agriculture, Computing Technology, Industrial Technology (Farm Maintenance, Timber and Metal), Design & Technology, Food Technology and Textiles Technology. These subjects are aimed at developing creative, practical and problem-solving skills in a cooperative environment. All subjects are presented with a practical focus. Students develop hands-on skills using a range of tools and equipment to create projects that reflect their personal needs, creativity and design abilities.

Woodlawn has a strong reputation for providing excellent resources and producing great student work. Our students develop skills and competence, relevant to current industry requirements.

Within Technology Mandatory Years 7 and 8, we have again combined a number of focus area units with great success.

Digital Technology has provided students the opportunity to learn skills in coding, CAD, Laser and 3D printing.

In Materials Technology, Timber & Textiles were combined to produce a variety of projects. Students had the opportunity to create their own piece of fabric design and decorate the fabric using the Cricut machine. They also had the opportunity to use the Laser to engrave an image for their timber project.









AgriFood Technologies had students design and produce paddock to plate food items. Rotations of Year 7 and Year 8 Agrifood provided fantastic opportunities to experience growing vegetables for use in our cooking programs. The cooking tasks undertaken include basic biscuits, apple and choc chip muffins, sausage rolls, cheesy spinach puffs, pizzas, butter chicken and fried rice to demonstrate the ease of growing our own produce to be utilised in our own healthy recipes. Animal handling of the chickens is a particular favourite for many students, gaining practical experiences of feeding and handling whilst monitoring their growth through to the pullet stage. An advantage is also using our own eggs in our recipes.

Engineering Technologies saw students design and produce engineered mini toolboxes using both metal-working skills and laser technologies.

In Stage 5 Metalwork the Year 9 class produced excellent Fire Pit designs while developing useful industry-related skills. Designs are created using Fusion 360 then students manufacture their designs using the CNC Plasma Robot which produces them out of 3mm plate steel. In Stage 5 Industrial Technology Timber students have continued to develop and refine their skills to create timber projects they can be proud of. Students have a lot of scope in their designs to personalise their projects and opportunities to advance skills in areas they have an interest. The use of emerging technologies like CNC routers and Laser cut inlays give students an insight into the industry and enhance the aesthetic appeal of the final projects.

Farm Maintenance proved popular with students wanting to develop skills and knowledge in how to maintain a farm. Students learnt skills in welding, machining, fencing, engine servicing and animal shelters, as well as learning about weed & pest control.

Design and Technology has continued to be a popular subject choice in Year 10. Students had the opportunity to develop a major project based on the skills they developed during the course which provides engaging and meaningful experiences that reflect the skill requirements of industry into the future. On 1 July 2024, our Year 10 Design and Technology students travelled to the Valley of Craftsmen with their teacher, Sharon Thompson, and TAS Assistant, Trevor Robb, to explore the world of professional craftsmanship firsthand. Led by renowned local wood and metal artist Lawrence Clan, the students were introduced to the artistry and skill involved in creating unique, high-quality pieces.

Throughout the day, Lawrence shared his journey from passion to profession, offering valuable insights into his processes and the dedication required to turn creativity into a career. Students were thrilled to be able to select unique pieces of wood for upcoming projects, adding a personal touch to their work that will carry the inspiration from this visit.





The group also toured The Farm, where they saw Lawrence's beautifully crafted chopping boards made exclusively for the Three Blue Ducks restaurant, before visiting his retail outlet on Conway Street in Lismore. This experience gave students a complete perspective on the journey from concept and creation to branding and retail.

This hands-on experience was transformative for our students, sparking new ideas and deepening their appreciation for design and craftsmanship.

Stage 5 Agriculture saw students work cooperatively as a team to perform a variety of tasks relating to plant and animal production. A number of students also participated successfully at several local shows with our Show Cattle Team, winning a few prizes along the way.

Stage 5 Computing Technology students have focused on computational, design and systems thinking. They have developed data analysis and programming (coding) skills. The students have had opportunities to develop skills in analysing data, designing for user experience, connecting people and systems, developing websites and creating simulations or games.

They have also studied animal production and conducted a farm case study focusing on dairy production utilising Paul and Sharon Weir's property. It was a valuable learning experience to see first hand the variety of technologies available in the industry. This has provided a strong foundation for the student's HSC year.

Vocational Education & Training (VET)

It has been another exciting year for VET with students applying their knowledge and hands-on skills in a variety of pathways. As we reflect on the past year, I am thrilled to share the remarkable achievements of our VET students and the pathways they are creating for their futures.

Primary Industries, Entertainment, Construction, Metals & Engineering, Furniture Making, Hospitality and Fitness have seen a growth in numbers and success stories. When I began this role in 2019, we had 24 Year 12 students completing a VET qualification. Six years later, we have almost doubled the number of graduates leaving the College with one or more qualifications. A total of 74 qualifications or Statements of Attainment have been credentialed to 54 Year 12 students. Our Year 11 cohort is also following the trend, with multiple students selecting more than one VET course, with 44 students working towards 59 qualifications.

Vocational Education and Training courses play a crucial role in preparing students for the workforce. They offer hands-on experience and practical skills in various industries, allowing students to explore their interests while earning nationally recognised qualifications. With many students now completing multiple VET courses, this allows them to graduate with both their HSC and additional qualifications, which can set them apart in the competitive job landscape.

Work Placement feature

Work Placement is a compulsory part of our students' training. It allows students to apply what they have learned in the classroom to real-life situations. This hands-on experience is valuable because it helps students understand how to use their skills effectively. It also boosts their confidence, as they see how their training translates into actual work tasks.

Work placement also helps students build connections in their industry. When students work alongside professionals, they can network and make important contacts. These connections can lead to job opportunities in the future. Networking is a key part of finding a job, and work placement provides a great opportunity for students to start building their professional relationships. This year, several students were offered apprenticeships through their work placement experience and have left the College to pursue a career in their chosen industry.

Manufacturing & Engineering

The Manufacturing and Engineering program returned in 2024 for our Year 11 students. This course has offered students a comprehensive hands-on learning experience. By completing projects like the metal bench vice, sheet metal toolbox, and camping multi-shovel, students gain practical skills which are crucial for their engineering competencies.

For the Camping Shovel Project, using the CNC machine for the shovel's head and the metal lathe for shaping the handle provides a solid foundation in CAD and CAM techniques. The MIG welding process is a fantastic way for students to learn about metal joining and the importance of heat management, while finishing techniques will reinforce the need for quality control in ensuring durability and safety. Our range of updated equipment provides our students with state-of-the-art equipment to produce quality manufactured products.

Emphasising the use of various tools and machines not only builds the technical skills of the students, but also prepares them for real-world engineering tasks. This hands-on experience is invaluable for their future careers in engineering.









Primary Industries

The Stage 6 Primary Industries class had a busy year doing a variety of tasks for the Certificate II in Agriculture, including: basic animal observation and husbandry with the cattle to maintain their welfare standards; water maintenance and installation of new troughs; as well as weed control and chemical applications in the paddock areas. Students also spent time operating the new tractor. There has been significant time involved in the construction and maintenance of fences and the usual strip grazing with electric fencing. Students regularly conducted risk assessments and learned to implement safe work practices in all of the practical tasks. There was also significant personal growth in preparing for the HSC Examinations. The students are to be commended for their positive efforts, attitudes and contributions across the year.



Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE)



This year, the PDHPE faculty saw students across all year levels immerse themselves in a range of engaging and dynamic activities, helping them develop vital skills and knowledge for lifelong health and well-being.

Students in Year 7 embraced the theme of Celebrating Diversity; learning about the importance of inclusivity and respect for different cultures. They were introduced to Indigenous games, which gave them a deeper appreciation for Australia's rich cultural heritage. These hands-on experiences promoted teamwork and a sense of community while enhancing their understanding of Indigenous traditions.

Focusing on maintaining positive relationships, Year 8 students explored strategies to foster healthy connections with peers, family, and the wider community. Through playing a variety of world games, they broadened their understanding of global cultures, enhancing their teamwork and communication skills. These activities encouraged empathy and mutual respect, both on and off the playing field.

Year 9 focused on the theme "Looking Good, Feeling Great", emphasising the connection between physical fitness and mental well-being. Students engaged in a variety of net and court games, refining their skills and gaining confidence in their physical abilities. The curriculum also encouraged them to reflect on body image and healthy lifestyle choices, equipping them with tools for both mental and physical health.

Year 10 delved into Teen Risks, exploring topics such as substance use, peer pressure, and mental health. Students participated in a group dance task, which they performed confidently in front of their entire year group. This collaborative performance not only showcased their creativity and teamwork but also reinforced the importance of physical activity in building resilience and managing stress.

Year 9 Physical Activity and Sports Studies (PASS) students were put to the test in their biathlon and learned the finer points of training to improve performance.

The PASS class also participated in a wide variety of sports and activities, each designed to enhance their physical skills, teamwork, and understanding of different movement techniques. The class explored traditional sports such as soccer, basketball, and netball, where students not only practised foundational skills but also developed tactical knowledge and game strategies. These sports fostered teamwork and communication, with students learning to work collaboratively in various game settings.

In 2024, the Year 10 PASS class had a dynamic and productive year, with a particular focus on fundamental movement skills, event management, and issues in physical activity and sport. The students started by revisiting fundamental movement skills, such as running, jumping, throwing, and catching, enhancing their physical abilities and understanding how these movements underpin more complex sport-specific skills. This unit also helped the students appreciate the importance of these skills in everyday life, physical education, and sports participation. In the Event Management unit, students took on leadership roles, where they planned, organised, and executed small-scale sporting events. This provided valuable hands-on experience in logistical planning, teamwork, and problem-solving while promoting a deeper appreciation of what it takes to run successful sporting events. The class also explored a variety of contemporary issues in physical activity and sports, examining topics such as equity in sports, the role of technology in enhancing performance, and the impact of societal and cultural factors on participation in physical activity. This allowed students to critically engage with real-world issues and reflect on how they affect the broader sporting community. Overall, the year challenged students to think critically, work collaboratively, and develop both physical and intellectual skills that they will carry forward

This year the Year 10 Child Studies class engaged with a variety of important topics, helping students gain a deeper understanding of childhood development and care. The

class examined health and safety in childhood, exploring the critical importance of maintaining a safe environment for children and understanding various health issues that can arise. This unit emphasised practical ways to promote safety and health in various childhood settings. Students also explored career opportunities within the childcare and early education sectors, learning about the skills and qualifications required for roles such as early childhood educators and caregivers. This gave students insight into potential career pathways and the diverse range of jobs in the childcare industry. The impact of media and technology on children was another area of focus. Students investigated how media exposure and digital devices affect children's behaviour, learning, and socialisation. This helped them critically assess the role technology plays in childhood today. Finally, the class looked at how children engage with culture, emphasising the importance of cultural diversity and how childcare settings can foster respect and appreciation for different cultures. Through activities and discussions, students gained valuable insights into how cultural awareness can be integrated into childhood development and care.

Senior PDHPE students studied the concepts of health and physical fitness, focusing on health priorities in Australia. A significant part of their learning revolved around understanding epidemiology and the changing trends in morbidity and mortality, particularly around conditions such as cardiovascular disease and mental health issues. This allowed students to critically analyse how social determinants impact health outcomes and what preventative strategies can be employed at both personal and national levels. Additionally, practical sessions helped them refine their understanding of biomechanics, energy systems, and training principles to improve performance across various sports.

In Child and Family Studies students explored how family structures, socialisation, and technological change impact the well-being of individuals and communities. A key focus was understanding the diversity of family units and how emerging trends, such as the use of technology in family communication, affect interpersonal relation-



ships. Through conducting independent research, students delved into case studies on work-life balance, childcare services, and the role of advocacy in promoting equality and support for marginalised groups.

The Sport, Lifestyle and Recreation classes emphasised practical application through a variety of sports and recreational activities. Students developed skills in team sports, focusing on both performance and teamwork. They also delved into event management, working collaboratively to plan and execute sporting events. This experience strengthened their leadership, communication, and problem-solving skills, aligning with their studies on the broader role of recreation in promoting health and community engagement.

These courses collectively provided students with a holistic understanding of health, society, and sport, preparing them for real-world challenges and opportunities in the field of health and physical education.

We look to 2025 with excitement as the numbers in the KLA grow and we see the inclusion of the new Health and Movement Science syllabus for Year 11. A huge thank you to the PDHPE Faculty for their tireless and positive work ethic, their enthusiasm and their love of teaching. They are foundational in the creation of a school where students become lifelong learners, such as it is here at Woodlawn.




Aaliyah Garang-Hall

Library

2024 was a year of enjoyment and learning in the library. The Teacher Librarian role was shared between Catherine Graham-Smith, Alyssa Dwyer and Kathleen McLennan. Supported by our able assistants, Helen Koellner and Fiona Thompson, we endeavoured to guide our students with engaging and innovative lessons that lay the groundwork for their learning.

The year began with the celebration of Library Lovers' Week. This is a time for students and staff to celebrate the many and varied offerings the Library at Woodlawn provides. A vibrant display and competitions were enjoyed. Year 7 "Discovery Day" introduced our new cohort to the library and what we offer. It was also a chance to equip them with the organisational skills for effective learning in secondary school. In addition, the students were introduced to our protocols on digital etiquette and making safe choices online. It was a very successful day and one that set the foundation for their years at Woodlawn.

The teacher librarians worked broadly with classes from Years 7 - 12. Junior students were taught how to negotiate the web and be discerning users of media, while Senior students were given detailed instruction on how to use databases, analyse journal articles, write literature reviews and cite sources. Libguides were used extensively in English, History, and Society and Culture. In particular, the Teacher Librarian worked with Year 8 English classes for the whole of Term 3. The focus was the Book Expo - a wonderful unit based on individual work and differentiation. At times, there were four adults

working with one class; student engagement was high, and the level of work was impressive. The introduction of digital activities created with Artificial Intelligence (AI) enhanced particular learning experiences and contributed to deep student engagement. Book Expo was celebrated in the Hall with Year 8 English and again the quality and depth of engagement were evident in the varied displays.

Our Read for Ten programme, which occurs in the first ten minutes of Period 5 for Years 7-10, was again promoted by library staff. Borrowing has increased steadily because of this. This year, our collection development focus was on non-fiction suitable for reluctant readers. Some of our annual budget was well spent extending our collection with the addition of books on motorcross, extreme sports and soccer. Interest in indigenous writing was heightened with the visit of Steve Trotter who spoke fervently about his novel series, The Magpie and the Snake.

On a professional development level, the Teacher Librarian embraced the use of AI in education. Always a lifelong learner, she curated a comprehensive libguide on the tools that teachers could use to enhance and redefine their current practices. With a focus on using the correct prompts and the ethics involved in the adoption of AI, the Teacher Librarian led a practical teacher information session on a staff development day. This was to be the first of many sessions needed on this exciting new platform in education. This session was also presented to the Diocesan Secondary Library team in Term 4.

Our dedicated library staff are proof of our shared vision. Teacher, Alyssa Dwyer, tackled her new role in the library with passion and engagement in Term 1. However, her



In Week one of Term 4, 21 students and 2 teachers embarked on the annual South Passage sailing trip from Brisbane to Coffs Harbour. It was a fun-filled five days with special memories being made of hoisting the sails, whale spotting, epic Uno games and a fair bit of sea sickness.

The trip began on Monday afternoon with a walk around the marina and a delicious dinner at the Manly Boat Club before we boarded the ship for our first night sleeping in our bunks below deck. Students were very excited to set up their beds and to fall asleep to the gentle rocking of the waves.

On Tuesday students began to learn the ins and outs of sailing, including how to tie different knots, hoisting the sails and a few navigation skills. Students were put into their watch groups and assigned a Watch Leader who guided them throughout the trip. We sailed around Moreton Bay and anchored near Peel Island for a swim before venturing to the Gold Coast and mooring near Runaway Bay for the night. The day ended at midnight after a long 90-mile journey to Yamba where we anchored for the night. Lots of whales were spotted along the way!

Thursday saw us sail further down the coast and stop about 10 miles off Wooli in the Solitary Islands Marine Park for a swim off the side of the boat. It was quite windy and the boat was really rocking! The Skipper decided that it was too rough to stay there so instead we pushed on

to Coffs Harbour and spent the night in the Coffs Harbour Marina.

Friday was possibly the most exciting day for the students as it was "Command Day". This was the last day of the trip and also the day that the students commanded the boat on their own. The students voted their peers in for particular jobs and the following students were voted in:

Kokoda Challenge

> "It was 2am, we had been walking for nearly a day straight, and we had become delirious. In these quiet moments, the mountains had become a mystery, enveloped by the darkness, and it made them seem so much more daunting..."

Two teams set out to tackle the Kokoda Challenge - a gruelling, continuous hike through the Gold Coast hinterland. As a fundraising event, the annual Kokoda Challenge provides guidance for "youth in our local communities to undertake life-changing experiences, encouraging them to reach their full potential as young adults." In the same way that these youth are shaped by the values of the Kokoda Spirit, so too did I witness our own Woodlawn students experience the crucible of 'Courage, Endurance, Mateship, and Sacrifice."

When I was approached by the Year 11 boys to be their staff chaperone, I was thrilled at the invitation. Professional rapport had been achieved!

When they told me we would be attempting the 96 km hike, I was apprehensive but determined. When I then found out that there had been the option to only walk 48 km the whole time (which the boys had failed to mention) I was betrayed! These guys were summiting the peak of their youth, whilst I was napping back at the lodge...

Undeterred, our two teams (each with 4 students and one staff member) arrived at the starting line (one of us at 4:30am, the other at a leisurely 10 am...) on the Gold Coast and psyched ourselves up for what was to come. The bustling crowd buzzed with anticipation, adjusting their walking poles and checking their thermals were packed. There were a number of school teams present, amidst the throng of casual and competitive trekkers, and marked by the ANZAC salute of rifle fire, we were off! Only 28 hours to go...

The subsequent trek was probably one of the most mentally defining challenges I have encountered, easily surpassing the trek to Everest Base Camp experienced in my twenties. As Mr Zac Landrigan reflected, "the slopes were rough and rugged, many were close to vertical, and they made you feel like you were climbing a ladder. The hills at the start were the harshest to climb but not yet the hardest. As it got late into the night, we had been warned

that this would be the toughest point. People would go quiet, and begin to truly struggle."

It is a unique feeling, to be walking with purpose and yet aimless, guided yet lost. For myself and my team, this was uncharted territory, simply following the path from one sunrise to the next. For our team, the boundless energy of our four athletic sportsmen guickly dwindled, forcing their minds to turn inwards in a struggle against fatigue. Each stage of the day saw the crowd thinning, separating, disappearing around subsequent bends, lost to the march of their own pace. Friendly banter became quieter observations, soon ceasing entirely. Laughter and jokes in the middle of the night helped to fight off tiredness and the dark, and yet the knowledge of how far was left to go remained untouched. The biggest thanks went to those amazing heroes in our support crew the families who gave up their time and warm beds to operate a makeshift sustenance camp at each major checkpoint. Without them, morale would not survive, so I am beyond grateful for their efforts.

How do I feel about mountains? Well, they have their ups and downs. *cue appreciative applause*

In this case, however, the ups were really up, and those downs - sheesh!

In a more figurative sense, though, this was the looping mentality that paraded around in our brains the entire 28 hours we walked. How far is this hill going to go? When will I reach the top? What's around that next bend? Why did I bring so much beef jerky? I think it is safe to say that I was not alone in my own private moments of despair, questioning why I was doing this walk altogether, why the next checkpoint seemed to never arrive, why the boys didn't know that 48 is less than 96.

For each of us, there long existed a choice - give up, or keep placing one foot in front of the other. This was never an easy choice, and was a burden of weight to carry on our shoulders. As writer and climber Jon Krakauer reminisced on his five weeks establishing a new route on an icy Alaskan peak, "I thought that if I did something that hard and pulled it off, my life was gonna be transformed." And whilst, for Jon, no transformation took place, I believe that all four young men on my team did experience some new change within themselves. This change was not dictated by reaching any finish line, but was instead a reaction to the attempt alone. The decision to make a go of something difficult, the pushing of one's limits, the pursuit of the unknown. Not all of our team walked the full 96 km, but each step taken was one further from adolescence - one step closer towards Courage, Endurance, Mateship, and Sacrifice.

Cambodia Immersion



Building Bridges in Cambodia: An Unforgettable Journey of Service and Discovery

This year's Cambodia immersion trip proved to be a transformative experience for 24 students and three teachers who embarked on a journey that would challenge their perspectives and open their hearts. The expedition centred around service work at the Marist Solidarity LaValla School in Phnom Penh's Ta Khmau

province, where our students discovered that the act of giving often leads to receiving far more in return.

At LaValla, our group rolled up their sleeves and dove into physical labour, clearing the ground for a future classroom that will serve generations of Cambodian students. Between maintenance tasks supporting the grounds staff, our students found their true calling in the afternoons – connecting with LaValla's students through interactive lessons, lively games, and dance instruc-



tion. These moments of cultural exchange transcended language barriers, revealing the universal language of friendship, laughing and learning.

The pure joy radiating from LaValla's students during these interactions left an indelible mark on our group. Impromptu bocce matches, volleyball games, and casual conversations filled the hours between organised activities, creating bonds that will last far beyond our stay. It was in these unscripted moments that the most meaningful connections were formed.

Beyond their service work, our students immersed themselves in Cambodia's rich cultural tapestry. They gracefully attempted traditional dance moves during a cultural workshop, witnessed breathtaking views during a sunset cruise on the mighty Mekong River, and mastered local cuisine in a cooking class. A highlight for many was watching the sun rise over the ancient temples of Angkor Wat in Siem Reap, a moment that captured the timeless beauty and spirituality of Cambodia.

Our students put their newly acquired language skills to the test in local markets, confidently bargaining for souvenirs and gifts. These interactions provided not just mementos but valuable lessons in cross-cultural communication and understanding.

However, this journey wasn't just about collecting pleasant memories. Visits to the S21 prison and the Killing Fields served as powerful reminders of Cambodia's tragic recent history. These sobering experiences prompted deep reflection among our students about the value of



freedom, family, and friendship – blessings often taken for granted at home.

As we returned, it was clear that Cambodia had left an enduring mark on each participant. The immersion trip achieved far more than its educational objectives; it fostered empathy, cultural understanding, and personal growth. Our students returned not just with souvenirs in their bags but with transformed perspectives in their hearts and minds, ready to apply these lessons in their own communities.
